This month as we celebrate the third anniversary of Laudato Si', we also commemorate the 25th anniversary of the United Nations International Day for Biological Diversity (IDB). The United Nations commemorates this day each May 22nd to increase understanding and awareness of biodiversity issues.

Pope Francis also gives attention to biodiversity issues in the first chapter of Laudato Si' as he both celebrates the gift of diversity and laments its loss. What Is Driving Deforestation?

- Production of beef, soy, palm oil and wood products account for the majority of tropical deforestation.
- In countries producing the majority of these products 15,000 sq. mi. of tropical lands are devastated each year.
- 10% of global warming emissions are due to deforestation.
- Converting forest to pasture for beef cattle, largely in Latin America, is responsible for destroying 2.71 million hectares of tropical forest each year.



Palm oil is used in countless processed foods and personal care products, as well as biofuels and vegetable oil. Produced largely in Southeast Asia, palm oil packs a powerful climate punch, not only because of the amount of land deforested annually (270,000 hectares in three leading countries), but also because much of this area includes the carbon-rich soils known as peatlands. Peatlands contain up to 28 times as much carbon as the forests above them—carbon that's released to the atmosphere when peatlands are drained for oil palm plantations. As a result, palm oil contributes the most global warming emissions of any commodity besides beef.

What We Can Do to Contribute to a Deforestation-Free Future

- Make sure that the forest-derived products you buy are made from 100 percent post-consumer content materials.
- Make informed food choices. Eating a plant-based diet or reducing your consumption of animal products like meat and dairy can help save forests.
- Buy from companies that have a commitment to reducing deforestation through forest-friendly policies. If you are buying products made from virgin forest fiber, make sure that it bears a seal from a credible forestry certification system, like the Forest Stewardship Council.
- Avoid products that include palm oil.
